Dear Members:

Our time at the California-Hawaii Elks Association convention in Palm Springs was inspiring and encouraging. We learned more about Elkdom, shared ideas to strengthen our lodges, and celebrated the swearing in of our new state association officers, including Lynn Glick, our first female State Association President. It was a meaningful reminder that when Elks come together with a shared purpose, we return home energized and ready to serve.

At the heart of the convention—and at the heart of who we are as Elks—stands the California-Hawaii Elks Association Major Project, often known through its fundraising symbol, the Purple Pig. Since 1950, the Major Project has been devoted to addressing the unmet needs of children with disabilities throughout California and Hawaii by providing supportive services at no cost to families and without discrimination.

Through the generous support of Elks and friends, the program funds professional occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech-language pathologists, and preschool vision screeners who serve children when other resources may not be available. This work changes lives in practical, lasting ways: helping children walk, talk, see, play, and gain greater independence, while giving families hope and support when they need it most.

Imagine a child born with a condition that makes the ordinary tasks of childhood far more difficult than they should be. For that family, the emotional strain can be matched by the cost of medical care, therapy, and the daily challenges of providing the support their child needs. Now imagine the difference when the Elks

Major Project steps in with physical, occupational, or speech therapy at no cost to the family. That care can help a child build strength, coordination, confidence, and independence — opening the door to a fuller life and the opportunity to grow into a capable, productive and independent member of society. This is the kind of hope your support makes possible.



As we reflect on an uplifting convention in Palm Springs, we are reminded that our greatest strength is not only in our fellowship, but in our willingness to serve. The best way to honor that inspiration is to continue supporting the Major Project in every way we can. Please drop your change into the Purple Piggybanks around the lodge, take one home and fill it with your spare change, and participate in fundraisers that help this life-changing program continue its work. Every contribution, large or small, helps children and families receive the care, encouragement, and opportunities they deserve. That is Elkdom in action, and it is a mission worthy of all our hearts.

Secretary's Corner

ALL MEMBERS SHOULD HAVE PAID THEIR ANNUAL DUES BEFORE NOW.

The grace period ended May 31. After that date members will need to reinstate for \$50 and the prorated dues, which will be \$196 per year. I had to drop 107 members, who had not paid their dues for 2024-2025. Some of them have come back and paid during the grace period. We ended the year with 1,312 paid members. About 200 of you have not paid your dues. We are still the #1 Elks Lodge in the District.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL MEMBERS

The building's mortgage currently at Coast Central Credit Union is due the middle of June. We had a 15-year loan that was amortized at 30 years. That means we made payments as if the loan was a 30-year loan; however, the loan was for only 15 years. The consequence is that we now need to refinance. We had three banking institutions bid on the refinance. The Lodge Board of Trustees concluded that the best for the Lodge was Redwood Capital Bank. The Lodge Treasurer and Lodge Secretary concur.

The proposal by Redwood Capital Bank was presented on the Floor of the Lodge on May 20.

The Lodge Floor accepted their proposal by a unanimous vote of those present. A building Application will be completed and filed with Grand Lodge. **This article is proper notice that a final vote for Floor approval of the refinanced loan will take place on June 17, 2026.**

OTHER NEWS

We have been cleaning up the area around the Lodge, power washing the deck, and basically getting ready for summer. There are two projects coming up. One is painting and the other is roofing. These are necessary maintenance projects. The refinance will cover those costs. The roofing has been covered in past discussions and voting as indicated in the minutes. The painting will be the next large maintenance project put before the Trustees and the Lodge Floor.

For the four Nord children, she wasn't just a mom, she was a fixture of their upbringing and the backbone of their extracurricular lives. She took field trips, was a classroom volunteer, youth leadership, serving as a campfire leader and Cub Scout mentor and the "Team Mom", the Nord household became a hub for local high school athletes.

In the 1970s, she and her husband Larry purchased Cal Courts. While many see it as a fitness center, for her, it has always been a people center and she's still active in the business today. Even as her own children have grown, her commitment to Eureka hasn't wavered. "So long as there are veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them."

For the 21st year, the North Coast Veterans Stand Down will be holding its three-day event at the Humboldt County Fairgrounds in Ferndale, September 24, 25 & 26. The three-day event provides veterans and their families with hot meals, clothing, medical and dental care, legal assistance, and overnight accommodation along with pet-friendly transportation.

Members of our lodge provide aid to the Stand Down in multiple ways, including setup and teardown of the event, supervising the distribution of clothing and personal care items to attendees, along with financial support funded through an Elks National Foundation (ENF) Freedom Grant.

Lodge member Ann Poole and co-chair Bev Olson coordinate the lodge sponsored Stand Down Clothing and Small Goods Store. The ladies work year-round collecting donated items for the Stand Down. Donations include new and used clothing, winter coats, rain gear, sleeping bags, tents and shoes including vouchers for the purchase of a new pair from a local business.

Donations: For members who wish to donate items for the Stand Down there is a collection barrel in

the closet just off the lobby at the lodge for your convenience to drop off any offerings. Items they are short each year include wallets, belts and suspenders and wool-blend hiking socks. The veterans prefer wool socks as they keep their feet warmer and dryer during our cold, wet winters.

All are more than welcome to come and volunteer for the whole event, one day or just a few hours. Ann and Bev appreciate any help that comes their way, as they are constantly rearranging clothing along with assisting any veterans that need help. 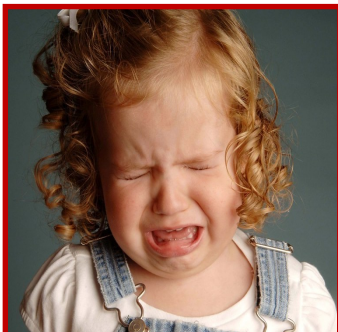
